About the Walk of Sorrow:

The Walk of Sorrow started on June 5, 2021 at the site of the former Prince Albert Indian Residential School where Patricia Ballantyne had been a student at the school from 1978 to 1987. She started the walk after the remains of 215 First Nations children were found buried at a former residential school site in Kamloops, B.C.


Ballantyne said the walk is a way to heal following the discovery. Nearly three weeks after her walk started, another horrific discovery was made. The Cowessess First Nation in Saskatchewan found an estimated 751 unmarked graves on the grounds of the former Marieval Indian Residential School.

It was through prayers and tears that residential school survivor Patricia Ballantyne walked along the road heading for Ottawa after hearing of the grim discovery of 751 unmarked graves at a former Saskatchewan residential school.

"We all cried together," Ballantyne told CTV News. "The number was shocking, so we cried together that night and prayed, and along the way yesterday we just prayed and walked and kept thinking about our ancestors and how many generations we lost."

Ballantyne said the discovery gave them a new push to keep walking. Along the way, Ballentyne said there have been opportunities to teach her daughter, niece and nephew, who have all joined her on the walk. "It is going to be something that they'll never forget and they are going to be teaching their children," she said. "They are learning too what their parents went through, and why the lives were so hard for First Nations people."





Oral Health and Diabetes

One of the many areas in our lives that can be affected by living with diabetes is our oral health. Diabetes affects our teeth, gums, and bones that support our teeth. Our dental and overall health requires our blood sugars to be at the correct levels. With high blood sugar levels, we are at an increased risk of gum disease.

Signs of gum disease:

Bleeding gums when we brush or floss them.

Red, swollen or tender gums.

Bad breath.

Gums that are pulling away from the teeth.

Pus between the gums and teeth.

Teeth that are painful or loose.

Changes in the way teeth are fitting together.

Changes in the way dentures fit.

Lots of people have gum disease and don't even know it. However, early stages of gum disease can be reversed through brushing and flossing daily to remove plaque. The more advanced stages of gum disease can cause permanent damage to the bones supporting our teeth.

Easy ways for keeping our smiles healthy:

Brushing teeth after each meal and before bed.

Flossing once daily.

Keeping blood sugars under control.

Treating gum and tooth infections and oral pain early.

Making healthy food choices.

Cleaning dentures daily.

Avoid smoking.

See your dental professional on a regular basis.



Summary

The First Nations Child Welfare Navigator (herein *Navigator*) will provide screening and brief assessment for children, youth, and families experiencing involvement with the children's aid societies of Ontario. Based on information ascertained in the initial intake the Navigator will then make referrals to the appropriate services, including internal and external resources not limited to applicable programming, Prevention Services and Family Well-Being services, as well as other departments of Algonquins of Pikwakanagan First Nation's organization umbrella (herein *AOPFN*), as required to best fit the needs of the service users.

The Navigator will monitor the progress of the treatment plan through case consultations and follow-up sessions and will engage further resources as required. When engaging resources, the Navigator will also aid in bridging the gap between Indigenous and non-Indigenous understandings of social welfare and healing practices. This form of advocacy will not only provide education about traditional practices to service providers but also educate the service users on the culturally specific practices being employed with that provider.
