Why are we creating a Land Use Plan?

The Land Use Plan must reflect our community's collective vision for how our lands are used and developed in the future. We have held several meetings over the past 2 years with members to make sure your ideas and input are part of this plan.

Adopting the final Land Use Plan will involve a community ratification vote as required by our Land Code. We anticipate the ratification vote happening over summer and will provide members with notice once a voting date is set.

SARS-CoV-2 in Deer in Ontario

The Ontario Ministry of Northern Development, Mines, Natural Resources and Forestry would like to provide you with information regarding the results of a recent <u>study</u> which found the virus that causes COVID-19 (SARS-CoV-2) in 17 white-tailed deer from southwestern Ontario. In addition, there has been a probable case of transmission of the virus from a deer to a human. The ministry is taking this opportunity to proactively communicate with Indigenous communities, licensed Ontario hunters and anyone handling wildlife to take precautions and follow health and safety recommendations when handling and processing wildlife, including:

- · maintain up-to-date vaccinations for COVID-19
- · process harvested wildlife outdoors or in a well-ventilated area
- · wear a well-fitted mask, disposable gloves and eye protection
- · avoid splashing fluids from wildlife, especially respiratory tissues
- · wash hands or use hand sanitizer after handling live wildlife or carcasses and after removing gloves
- clean and sanitize equipment and surfaces between uses
- · keep pets/hunting dogs away from carcasses and discarded tissues
- · don't consume wildlife that appears sick or was found dead from unknown causes
- · don't feed wildlife it can spread disease
- don't work with wildlife if you think you may have COVID-19

The Ministry would like to stress that there is currently no known risk of eating venison if food safety recommendations such as those developed by the <u>Public Health Agency of Canada</u> are followed. Although the live virus has not been found in meat, if present, the virus would be killed at the recommended internal cooking temperature of 74°C (165°F). DIABETES AND OUR FEET

As we get into warmer months, we can trade in our clunky winter boots with more suitable spring weather shoes. Make sure your feet are enjoying the shoes they're walking in.

- Go shoe shopping at the end of the day when your feet are most swollen.
- Have your shoes professional fitted if you have loss of sensation in your feet (neuropathy).
- The retailer should measure your foot both in the seated and in the standing position.
- Check the length, width, and depth of your foot while standing.
- The widest part of the shoe should be where the ball of your foot rests.
- When the shoe is on, it should feel snug but not tight.
- Make sure there is room for your toes to wiggle.
- Find a shoe that is appropriately shaped for your foot.
 Some shoes are made more curved while others are straighter.
- Replace your shoes and insoles regularly.
- The best shoe is the one that fits your foot comfortably.

Features of a supportive shoe...

- Fits well
- Made out of breathable material
- Has a firm heel
- Has either shoelaces or Velcro
- Has good shock absorption
- Can't be twisted or bent
- Has no seams in the toe box



New Scholarship for Students from Algonquin Communities

PEMBROKE, April 19, 2022 – The Algonquins of Ontario (AOO) and the Taggart Group have officially announced the creation and launch of a new scholarship for students from Algonquin communities, *The Taggart Award for Algonquin Students*.

Created to support Algonquin students who require financial assistance for their post-secondary education, the AOO and Taggart have leveraged additional support through a partnership with Indspire for up to 12 students to receive \$3,000 each through the new award in 2022-23.

"The last two years have been particularly difficult for all students. In partnership with Taggart, this scholarship is meant to provide Algonquin students support as they reach for their goals."

"The Taggart Group is proud to be part of this special award recognizing the hard work of young Algonquins who are deeply committed to their education and giving back to their

communities," said Michelle Taggart, Vice President Land Development, Tamarack Developments & Taggart Investments.

"This award represents a significant new opportunity for Algonquin learners to pursue their dreams through education," said Mike DeGagné, President & CEO of Indspire. KILLALOE OPP INVESTIGATE FRAUD COMPLAINTS

(KILLALOE, ON) - There are many sophisticated frauds and scams in Canada. The intent of many of these frauds and scams is to take your hard earned money.

On Monday, April 4, 2022, Killaloe OPP responded to an online fraud call in the Township of Bonnechere Valley. The complainant answered an online add to purchase a puppy. After sending a sum of money by e-transfer the puppy was never received.

On Wednesday, April 6, 2022, Killaloe OPP responded to a fraud call on the Algonquin's of Pikwakanagan Ontario First Nation Territory. The complainant donated a sum of money to an online individual to support a cause. The complainant was instructed that after sending the money they would be awarded an even larger sum of money. The online individual became increasingly demanding, leading the caller to contact police.

Police remind community residents of the following TIPS to protect yourself:

- Never provide personal information such as name, date of birth or address by phone, text or e-mail unless you initiated it.
- Never provide financial information or social insurance number by phone, text or e-mail unless you initiated it.
- Never purchase and send gift card information to anyone claiming that you must do this to collect a prize.
- Never send money in any form to anyone claiming you have won a prize and need to send money to receive that prize.
- Immediately contact your financial institution if you have provided any of your financial information.
- Always check your source before making a purchase.
