

The Importance of why we test well water:

Your well water can affect the health of everyone who consumes it. Health Services test for the indicators of bacterial contamination:

Coliforms: These bacteria are often found in animal waste, sewage, as well as soil and vegetation. If they are in your drinking water, surface water may be entering your well from a nearby source

E.Coli: If they are in your drinking water, it usually means that animal or human waste is entering your well from a nearby source

Recruit cohorts (High School/Friendship Club/Opeongo Centre) and design sessions

Sept – Nov 2022

Establish Relationships

A group of up to 6 youth and 6 seniors will plan to meet at Madawaska school and Opeongo senior centre. The group will meet up to 8 times during this period to establish the parameters of the project, design the interview packet, learn basic interview techniques and how to use the audio equipment.

Each session will be facilitated by the lead sound artist and guest facilitators.

Content Collection

The established cohort of up to 12 participants will go into the community to conduct their interviews and collect the sound content.

Nov-Jan 2022

Sound Design

The Sound Art Facilitator will review the content collected and work with Sound Artist Mentor to edit the content into a collection of draft sound art pieces.

January 2022 – February, 2023

Review and Feedback

The Sound Art Facilitators will present the preliminary concepts and draft pieces to the cohort for input and feedback. Based on the input from the cohort, the facilitators will edit and finalise the sound art pieces for presentation.

March 2023

Presentation

The final sound art pieces will be present at a public presentation events. This event will take place in person if possible, with a virtual option available as well. The final pieces will have a permanent home via the virtual gallery on the OV-CAOS website.

HOT HEAT = COOL TREATS

STRAWBERRY, WATERMELON AND VANILLA POPSICLES

Ingredients:

- 1 cup watermelon, cut in cubes

- Blend the strawberries, watermelon and maple syrup into a puree. If you want a few chunks in your popsicle, just roughly blitz it instead of pureeing.
- Fill your popsicle molds by alternating between the fruit puree and the yogurt.
- Slide a wooden popsicle stick into the centre of each mold and freeze for 2+ hours.

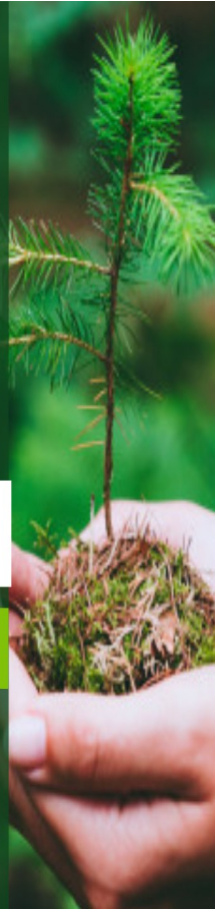

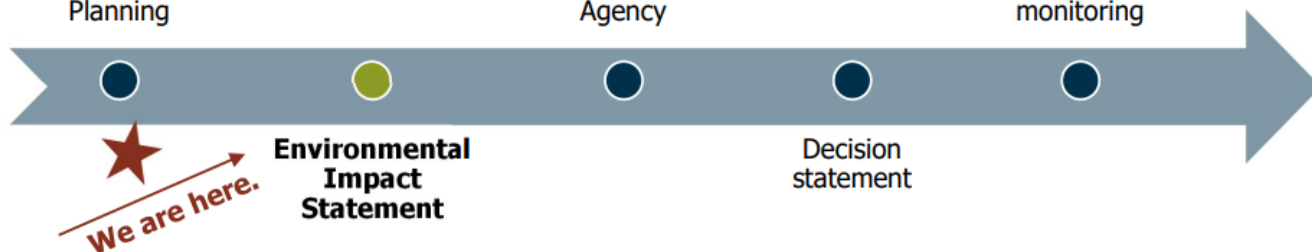

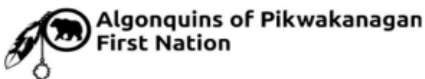
