Held at the Makwa Centre, the

ceremony honoured all the gradu-ates from the Mindiwin Manido Day

The ceremory began with a Wel-come Song, performed by Michelle Whiteduck, to launch the entry pro-cession led by Chief Greg Sanzzin, carrying the Eagle Staff, and band member, Craig Bernard, carrying the Community Flag. They were fol-lowed by dancers Nevaeth Sanzzin and Madden Benoti and the graduates.
