Pikwakanagan hosts its 29th annual graduation ceremony

Pikwakanagan – The Algonquins of Pikwakanagan First Nation celebrated its annual graduation ceremony last Thursday night with family and friends turning out to honour the 48 graduates who were recognized for their achievements this past school year.

Held at the Makwa Centre, the ceremony honoured all the graduates from the Mindwin Manido Day Care facility right up to the post-secondary levels of either college or university.

The ceremony began with a Welcome Song, performed by Michelle Whiteduck, to launch the entry procession led by Chief Greg Sarazin, carrying the Eagle Staff, and band member, Craig Bernard, carrying the Community Flag. They were followed by dancers Nevaeh Sarazin and Madden Benoit and the graduates.

Councillor Don Bilodeau, the emcee for the evening, congratulated the graduates, followed by an opening prayer and song by Barry

Sarazin.

Chief Sarazin told the graduates that like most of them, he was born and raised in Pikwakanagan and had spent most of his life there. He attended St. James Catholic School in Eganville and Opeongo High School before heading off to college and university, and then returned to the First Nation.

"All those years ago, I was sitting where you are this evening, never thinking that someday I would be standing here in front of my community, in front of my First Nation, as the Chief of the Algonquins of Pikwakanagan First Nation," he told the graduates. "You are young and you have achieved something great. You have graduated from your level of education and many of you will be moving on to your next level of education and that is fantastic," he added. "Many of you will be moving on to your chosen career and that is great too."

He told the graduates that whether they were moving on with their education or with their chosen career,

they will continue to learn.

"My best advice that I can give to you is that you should never stop learning, never stop working to make yourself better," he remarked. "You have all the potential in the world. Keep at it and there's no telling what you might be capable of achieving."

"You are the future of Pikwakanagan, you are our future leaders," he added. "You have great potential, your future is bright, keep on learning and keep on achieving."

Jasmine Pessendawatch-Borutskie, the valedictorian for 2023, graduated from Brock University in St. Catharines with a Bachelor of Arts, Honours-Psychology.

"I am honoured to be standing before you today as the valedictorian of this year's graduating class," she began. "I would like to congratulate all the graduates: daycare, kindergarten, elementary, high school, post-secondary and the trades for their accomplishments."

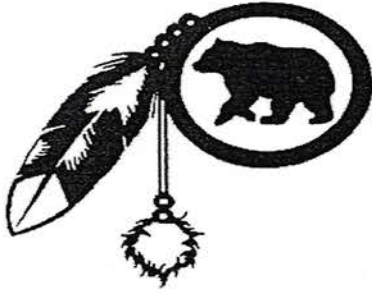

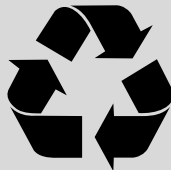
