IT IS WITH PROFOUND LOVE, AND SYMPATHY THAT WE ANNOUNCE JOSEPH SARAZIN TOOK HIS PLACE AMONGST OUR ANCESTORS THE NIGHT OF NOVEMBER 6, 2023.

BORN IN PIKWAKANAGAN ON DECEMBER 24TH OF 1964, TO JACQUELINE AND STANLEY SARAZIN, JOE HAD A CHILDHOOD FILLED WITH FAMILY, CULTURE AND TRADITION. HE SPENT MUCH OF HIS EARLY YEARS GETTING INTO MISCHIEF WITH HIS BROTHER'S, AND LEARNING THE WAYS OF THE LAND FROM HIS PARENTS. JOE SPENT HIS LATER YEARS FINDING PEACE IN HIS WOODWORKING. A SKILLED CRAFTSMAN, WITH A HUMBLE BEGINNING IN RESTORING WAYWARD AND DISCARDED FURNITURE, JOE INEVITABLY HONED HIS CRAFT TO MAKING WALKING STICKS, CANES, AND MARKERS FOR THE RESTING PLACES OF HIS LOVED ONES. THE PRIDE HE TOOK IN HIS WORK WAS SHARED BY MANY IN THE COMMUNITY.

JOE WAS KNOWN FOR HAVING THE BRIGHTEST SMILE AND THE LOUDEST LAUGH IN THE ROOM. BLESSED WITH A QUICK WIT AND A CLEVER USE OF WORDS, JOE OFTEN BROUGHT HIS SENSE OF HUMOR TO THOSE WHO NEEDED IT MOST. HE WAS NEVER SHY TO INCLUDE EVERYONE, OFTEN FINDING DEEP AND MEANINGFUL CONNECTIONS

WITH OUR MOST ISOLATED COMMUNITY MEMBERS. EVEN MENTIONING JOE'S NAME IN THE PRESENCE OF FRIENDS AND FAMILY GIVES BIRTH TO CONTAGIOUS SMILES, LAUGHTER, AND RECOLLECTIONS OF FOND MEMORIES; A LEGACY THAT WILL REMAIN WITH THIS COMMUNITY FOR GENERATIONS TO COME.

JOE IS SURVIVED BY HIS MOTHER JACQUELINE SARAZIN, BROTHERS GREG (HELEN) AND HENRY (DONNA) SARAZIN, HIS SON MICHAEL SARAZIN, AND GRANDDAUGHTERS RIVER AND LAYLA. HE JOINS HIS FATHER STANLEY, BROTHERS PAUL AND TOM AND SISTERS PEGGY AND GLORIA.

STATE OF EMERGENCY

December 1, 2023

Following the direction given to us by our community members, Chief and Council have officially declared a **State of Emergency in Pikwakanagan**, due to the opioid crisis that we are experiencing.

The community has made it clear to Chief and Council that enough is enough. Opioid-related harms, overdoses, and deaths repeatedly devastate our community, our families, and our front-line workers. Our community members have stated that we must access all available resources to help us to restore Pikwakanagan to a safe and healthy community.

Our Health and Mental Health Services have been increasing their efforts through social outreach programs, harm reduction strategies, and education to deal with this issue, but are unable to keep up as the crisis has been increasing. Declaring the **State of Emergency** in Pikwakanagan will enable us to bring to bear all available outside resources including access to more outside programs, services and funding.

- All outside agencies to be contacted to increase funding and professional assistance to help us to address the immediate health needs in the community.
- Resources and support to develop and implement community driven Opioid Strategic Plan, which will include culturally appropriate prevention, treatment, and aftercare services and programming, for Pikwakanagan.
- Increased Enforcement Services within the Pikwakanagan.

We are not alone in this fight against the Opioid crisis. Many communities across the country are also experiencing it. Our community has decided to do something about it and we are now working to reclaim our health, our dignity, and our sovereignty. It is with the support and direction of the community members, Chief and Council have declared this State of Emergency as part of our ongoing efforts to address this crisis. The opioid crisis will remain priority and together, we will continue to develop plans and strategies that will make a difference as we work towards our vision of a strong, healthy, safe, and thriving First Nation. COMMUNITY UPDATE

Pikwakanagan Opioid Crisis

December 8, 2023



STATE OF EMERGENCY

Algonquins of Pikwakanagan First Nation Chief and Council, with the support and direction of the community members, have declared a State of Emergency recognizing the serious health, social, and safety issues that are ongoing in the community due to the opioid crisis.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE CONTROL GROUP (ERCG):

The Emergency Response Control Group has been formulated from members of Chief and Council, and the Administration Staff who have been assigned specific roles to support the programs and services that will be provided to assist through the State of Emergency with the Opioid Crisis.

The Emergency Response Control Group has been established and will conduct **weekly meetings** to identify and address the key areas that have been brought forward by the community members at the previously held community meetings.

A list of these members has been provided within this communique.

TO DATE:

To date the organization has conducted two (2) community meetings that were held November 15th and November 23rd resulting in the clear mandate to Chief and Council to declare a state of emergency.

Since then, we have held a Healing Circle and sweat lodge ceremony and these are just the beginnings of the programs and events that are to be held over the upcoming months to support the community.

THE CURRENT PLAN

AOPFN will be receiving additional supports from a variety of agencies as we create a long term plan. Additional updates will be provided as this plan progresses.

Currently we are working on a crisis response plan. This will include, but not limited to the following:

- Increased Paramedic Services in the Community through Renfrew County Paramedic Services
- Immediate increased presence and patrols by the OPP
- Education on Naloxone Administration
- Wellness Checks and Assessments
- Harm Reduction Strategies
- Holistic Healing and Wellness Programs

HUNTERS AND COMMUNITY MEMBERS

The Natural Resources Department would like to remind all Hunters that the Regulations under the Provincial Wildlife Act prohibit a person from discharging a firearm within 1000 meters of a school, playground, or athletic field or within 300 meters of a dwelling (residence). In addition, charges under the Criminal Code could apply should a firearm be discharged in a way that causes a public safety concern.

For members and community safety we ask that no hunting take place within the prohibited distances mentioned above. Pikwakanagan is a growing community with homes scattered throughout its boundaries and members who walk the roads at all times of the day.

If you see suspicious hunting activities that may cause concern for public safety in our community, please report it to Police.



5 STEPS TO RESPOND TO AN OPIOID OVERDOSE

STEP 1		SHOUT & SHAKE their name & their shoulders
STEP 2		CALL 9-1-1 If unresponsive.
STEP 3		GIVE NALOXONE: 1 spray into nostril or inject 1 vial or ampoule into arm or leg.
STEP 4		PERFORM RESCUE BREATHING AND/OR CHEST COMPRESSIONS.
STEP 5		IS IT WORKING? If no improvement after 2-3 minutes, repeat steps 3 & 4. Stay with them.

RECOVERY POSITION
If the person begins breathing without cues, or if you have to leave them alone, put them in the recovery position.

- SIGNS OF OPIOID OVERDOSE**
- Person can't be woken up
 - Breathing is slow or has stopped
 - Snoring or gurgling sounds
 - Fingernails and lips turn blue or purple
 - Pupils are tiny or eyes are rolled back
 - Body is limp

A great tip is all about the details! When submitting a tip, please avoid providing your name or contact information to remain anonymous. Do not attempt to investigate a crime on your own, as it's best to leave it to the investigative team. Once submitted, your tip will be forwarded to the proper investigative agencies.

To provide a strong tip, focus on answering these key questions:

- Who is involved? Do you have any identifying details such as names, nicknames, or physical features?
- Where did the crime occur? Include the location, nearest cross streets, or specific address.
- When did the crime occur? Include the date and time.
- What type of crime are you reporting? Provide as many details as possible, including what you saw or heard.

Please note that we are unable to call you back to gather additional details as we do not have access to your contact information. Therefore, please provide as many details as possible in your initial tip. Even the smallest detail can be crucial to solving a crime. You can also upload photos, videos, and audio files online, which can be extremely helpful in making an arrest.

Please do not hesitate to submit a tip if you are unsure of all the details surrounding the crime. We encourage you to provide any information you have, and our team will work to piece together the full story.

It's important to understand that by providing information to Crime Stoppers, you are providing an important public service. We take measures to protect your anonymity, but it may be challenged in certain situations. This includes making a call with the intent of furthering criminal activity, framing an innocent person, or if disclosing some or all of the tip is necessary to establish someone's innocence.

Head Lice

Itching is the first sign of head lice. With a damp head and a plastic-fine tooth comb, brush small parts of your child's head from scalp to the end of the hair. It may be helpful to clip the hair into sections and thoroughly comb one section at a time. Head lice is spread by touching heads or by sharing items.

Treating Head Lice:

Live Head Lice needs to be treated with head lice shampoo, available at the pharmacy. You can also get a prescription and it may be covered by NIHB or OHIP+. After the treatment, you need to use a lice comb to remove nits and re-treat the hair in 7-10 days. Wash and dry in hot any items that were in contact with the head of the person who has lice. Non-washable items need to be placed in a sealed plastic bag for at least 2 weeks

RESPIRATORY ILLNESS INFORMATION

If you feel sick, please self-isolate until your symptoms are improving (and fever-free) for 24 hours. 
