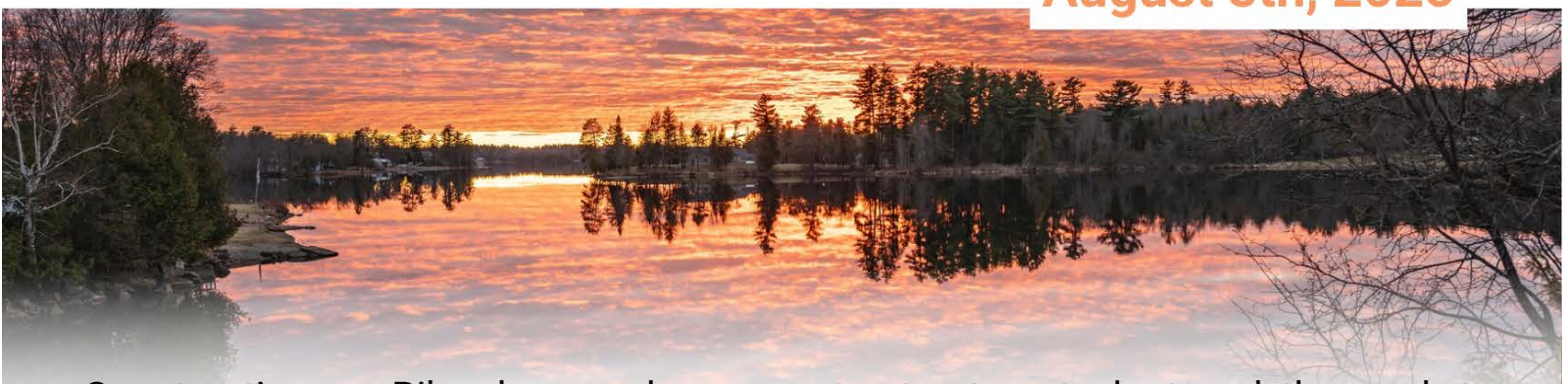

CHIEF & COUNCIL UPDATE

August 8th, 2025



Construction on Pikwakanagan's new water treatment plant and the work to supply good water to all our houses continues, now going into our third year. This is a really big job and it seems like it is taking forever, but now the end of construction is in sight and we are asking the community to be patient for a little while longer.

We have been informed that the mechanical and electrical works in the plant will be completed by September 30 this year and security fencing around the plant will be completed by October 31. Outside the plant, the installation of all watermain lines are planned to be complete by the end of September this year and the waterlines to all houses and other buildings are planned to be completed by October 31, this year also.

Water service connections to our houses and buildings are planned to begin in the spring of 2026 and completed by the end of June 2026. There are 242 houses and buildings to be hooked up, and when the plant produces potable water, the water distribution system can be brought online. After 38 years of trying, we will finally have good water to all of our houses and then, after all of that, repaving of our roads can occur.

COMMUNITY UPDATE

Ontario Bill 5 - Protect Ontario by Unleashing our Economy Act 2025 and Federal Bill C-5 - One Canadian Economy Legislation

Both legislations were developed without AOPFN's free, prior and informed consent (FPIC), which violates our rights under Section 35 of the Canadian Constitution and the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP).

BACKGROUND - Ontario Bill 5:

- April 27, 2025 - Bill 5 was **tabled** in the House of Commons
- June 4, 2025 – Bill 5 was **passed** by the Legislature
 - Bill 5 supports **faster development** by significantly accelerating provincial permitting and approvals, and would give the government the authority to designate special **economic zones**, where projects of provincial importance and security that are ready to advance and be led by trusted proponents, can benefit from streamlined requirements.
 - **Bill 5 changes impact the following Acts for all First Nations in Ontario:**
 - Endangered Species Conservation Act, Mining Act, Ontario Heritage Act, Special Economic Zones Act, and the Species Conservation Act.
- May 16, 2025 - AOPFN submitted our 'opposed response' online and by the deadline of May 17th.
- May 30, 2025 - AOPFN Community Update #1 was posted in the Newsletter & Facebook page
- June 2, 2025 - Chiefs of Ontario rallied at Queen's Park in TO, AOPFN unable to attend unfortunately
- June 6, 2025 - AOPFN Community Update #2 was posted in the Newsletter & Facebook page

BACKGROUND - Federal Bill C-5:

- May 26, 2025 - Bill C-5 was **tabled** in the House of Commons
- June 26, 2025 – Bill C-5 was **passed** by the Senate
 - Bill C-5 is an Act that enacts the Free Trade and Labor Mobility in Canada Act and the Building Canada Act, which allows the Canadian Government to **fast-track major projects** that are **deemed to be of national interest**.
 - Bill C-5 significantly weakens environmental protections and allows the Government to **bypass critical processes** that safeguard species at risk, cultural heritage, and treaty rights.
 - It concentrates decision-making power in the hands of Ministers and the Lieutenant Governor without mandating First Nation involvement, threatening sovereignty, and stewardship, and ongoing reconciliation efforts.
 - The speed of its formulation and implementation will make it impossible for the Government to uphold their commitments on the UNDRIP and Duty to Consult.
- June 17, 2025 - AOPFN Chief & Council sent our opposition letter to the Prime Minister of Canada.
- June 17, 2025 - the Chiefs of Ontario protested at Parliament Hill in Ottawa, in which AOPFN Chief & Council attended and Chief Sarazin spoke at.
- July 8, 2025 – AOPFN Chief & Council received an email reply on behalf of the Prime Minister of Canada, acknowledging receipt of AOPFN's opposition letter to Bill C-5 dated June 17, 2025.



KEY DATES & EVENTS:

- July 15, 2025 - AOPFN Consultation Department held a **Community Meeting** to provide updates on Bill 5 & Bill C-5 and to share AOPFN's initial comments. Roughly 15 members attended and had the following questions:

1. Based on Bill 5 changes, does that mean they won't consult with First Nations?

- It could, but we don't know yet.

2. When UNDRIP was created in Canada, AOPFN was one of the last ones to sign it. How or will that amend the Bill 5 legislation?

- We can share more, once when we have an opportunity to engage with the Government of Canada.

3. Who can attend the Bill C-5 Summit on July 16 & 17 in Gatineau?

- Only one leadership member from each First Nation was allowed to attend.
- AOPFN thought there was a Rally being organized but realized there wasn't

4. Members asked why AOPFN has been so reactive vs proactive?

- Both Legislations appeared and passed very quickly by Parliament, not giving AOPFN enough time to be proactive.
- AOPFN is working on being more prepared for all actions in relation to both Bills moving forward



5. What is the reason why we need to slow these [projects] down even more?

- AOPFN wants to make sure that proper consultation takes place on each project, which takes time.

6. How long do we think it will take to get proper resources?

- It can take a very long time, 6 months just for staffing and 6 months to a year for training. Look at a year and a half potentially

7. Are we creating a committee for this? It might be better than community meetings

- We will certainly take this suggestion into consideration.

8. Was Bill C-5 created as a streamline process to counter Trump's annexing Canada?

- The short answer is yes, but that's not the only reason.

9. Has any university or organization ever done a study on how effective Rallies are in creating change?

- a famous protest called the 'Oka crisis' in 1990. In that protest, the Government rolled out RCAP docs. Also mentioned was the 'Standing Rock' pipeline protest in the USA

- July 16 & 17, 2025 – a **Bill C-5 Summit** was held in Gatineau, QC by the Prime Minister of Canada with Ontario First Nation Leaders:

- As per the PM - today is about our economies and how we can build a new economy together, respecting rights is about our economies and how we can build a new economy together, respecting right is fundamental, and they will offer consultation process for feedback.
- **The One Economy Act can:** create careers, provide resources to health and social services, build Canadian's projects to build the nation's economy, and will build with First Nations and projects will be built with First Nations as partners.
- Projects will honour the rights, and new Indigenous Offices will have a council. This council will have a mix of Indigenous, Metis, and other groups.

- July 27, 2025 - **National Chief's Press Conference** held on by day two of the **Bill C-5 Summit**:

- A land recognition statement was made by the National Chief in regard to Algonquin Anishinabeg Territory.
- First Nations and Canada are at a critical point in nation-to-nation relationships.
- Historically, First Nations have stood up for Canada and are doing so again in Canada's stand against Trump's illegal tariffs.
- First Nations have always supported economic growth and prosperity, but not at the expense of our rights and the environment

- July 27, 2025 - **Chief Sarazin addresses on behalf of AOPFN**, on day two of the **Bill C-5 Summit**:

- In recent decades Indigenous Peoples and the Government of Canada have made incredible progress in building a vision of Canada that works for all of us.
- These Bills give Cabinet Ministers the ability to create Special Economic Zones (SEZ), something AOPFN is not overly familiar with. These SEZ can be anywhere in Ontario, and companies can get exemptions from Provincial and Federal laws within the SEZ.
- The only safety valve that appears to be build into Bill C-5, is that it will simply go away in five years. if it doesn't work out. My people believe that this is not enough, and we do not like any government directives where the backup plan involves sweeping it under the rug, and pretending it never happened.

Chief Sarazin's address con't:

- If the Canadian Government does not make this right, if it does not give all Indigenous Peoples the tools to participate in the One Canadian Economy legislation, this will be yet another occasion where it has robbed Indigenous people of their voices, and of their natural wealth and their sacred lands would otherwise provide
- The Algonquins of Pikwakanagan do not need to be taught how to protect our lands and waters we need the time to teach others how to protect our lands and waters – and if you insist that we only have half of that time, then it sounds like we need double the resources. We need capacity, we need tools, and we need the trust from governments, proponents, and partners that what our people want, need, and demand is what's best for all Canadians.
- We are demanding to keep comprehensive and effective consultations going. We are demanding our place as an integral part of if and when a proponent gains access to our unceded unsundered territory.
- Together we can prosper; and if we do it the right way, the way our ancestors have done since time immemorial, our descendants can do the same seven generations from now.

AOPFN NEXT STEPS:

- The Consultation Team will:
 - Continue to monitor all media coverage on both legislations and will provide on-going updates to Chief & Council as required.
 - Keep members informed of any potential Rallies held by any indigenous organizations.
 - Will prioritize and finalize existing Consultation Department Protocols and Policies
 - Will conduct an analysis of Bill 5 and Bill C-5 in regard to our existing FPIC approach, and where these laws have impact on AOPFN's FPIC approach.
- AOPFN will continue to stay in close contact with the Chief of Ontario, as AOPFN will need to have an action plan from the Chief when things potentially go wrong.
- AOPFN is currently waiting on funding, as PIK has already incurred costs in doing work on these Bills to date.
- **July 23, 2025 - Consultation Bill 5 was initiated with AOPFN**, from the Ministry of Economic Development, Job Creation & Trade, and the Office of the Deputy Minister. The title of the email was: **Proposed Regulation Criteria under Bill 5 Special Economic Zones Act, the Ontario Heritage Act, and Archaeology Exemptions**.
 - The Ontario ministries are seeking input from all First Nations, as they work to develop regulations under each Act above, and the Assistant Deputy Ministers and Directors have invited AOPFN to participate in upcoming Consultation Session(s), to discuss the proposals and provide an opportunity for Ontario to hear from AOPFN about any question/or concerns AOPFN may have about the potential impacts to our Aboriginal or treaty rights.
- July 24, 2025-AOPFN requested a one-on-one consultation **Meeting** with the Province too.
- July 30, 2025-AOPFN will attend a virtual Consultation **Session** in August, hosted by the Ministry of Economic Development, Job Creation & Trade and the Office of the Deputy Minister.
- August 28, 2025-is the deadline for AOPFN to provide initial feedback and AOPFN will also identify Indigenous-led projects that would fit within the 'Special Economic Zones' framework within our territory as well.



RECENT MEDIA HEADLINES:

- July 15, 2025 - nine First Nations in Ontario filed a constitutional challenge against the Provincial and Federal Governments, to kill parts of Bill 5 and Bill C-5.
 - Note that AOPFN is not part of the nine First Nations above, but AOPFN has been consulting with our Legal Team since both Bills were passed in June, to ensure that we are prepared to take legal action if necessary

CLOSING:

- AOPFN does not, and never has, claimed to speak for all Algonquins on this or any other matter and that we respect the rights of other Algonquin nations, Canada's duty to consult, and Canada's responsibility to uphold the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP) and Indigenous Rights to free, prior, and informed consent.
- Protection of the lands, waters and wildlife is always our top concern. The AOPFN will continue to inform proponents in respect to our Consultation & Engagement Protocols & Requirements in relation to projects in AOPFN's unceded Algonquin traditional territory.
