CHIEF & COUNCIL UPDATE

October 10, 2025

Driving through Pikwakanagan is feeling a little more normal these days as progress continues with the new water distribution system.

Chief Greg Sarazin and council are pleased that we were able to keep on schedule with fixing our roads and the beginning of paving of Kokomis and Mishomis. While the roads are not yet entirely complete, all our roads should soon be smooth and council is happy that members and visitors are able to travel through Pikwakanagan with fewe disruptions.



As discussed at the community meeting back on August 19th, water line installations to all houses should be complete by the end of October. Work on the water treatment plant will continue over the winter months and is still planned to be complete by March. Water service connections to all houses and buildings will begin in the spring with substantial completion expected by June 2026.

Council understands that this project has caused frustration and hardship for all of Pikwakanagan and we want to thank everyone for your patience and understanding. The end is in sight.

This has been a long and sometimes difficult process, but we want to assure you that it comes from a place of deep commitment to the future of our community. Access to safe, clean, and reliable water is part of our responsibility to care for one another and the generations to come.

Re: Kilby Property 12127 & 12239 Highway 60 (Farm and Beach Property)

The Kilby Farm and Beach Property was purchased in 2021 by 2480446 Ontario Inc., AOPFN's land holding corporation. **The property is managed by AOPFN Limited Partnership** for economic development purposes.

In the past, there has been confusion and misunderstanding regarding the usage of this property. Some band members have used the property without permission. A small number of individuals have also caused damage. Unauthorized use and damage create significant risks for AOPFN, including legal liabilities and increased insurance costs.

The Kilby Farm property is NOT a park or a campground. The property should be treated like any other part of our community that has been allocated to a specific purpose.

Unauthorized use of the property will not be tolerated.

The AOPFN Limited Partnership will notify the OPP of any unauthorized access or damage to the property.

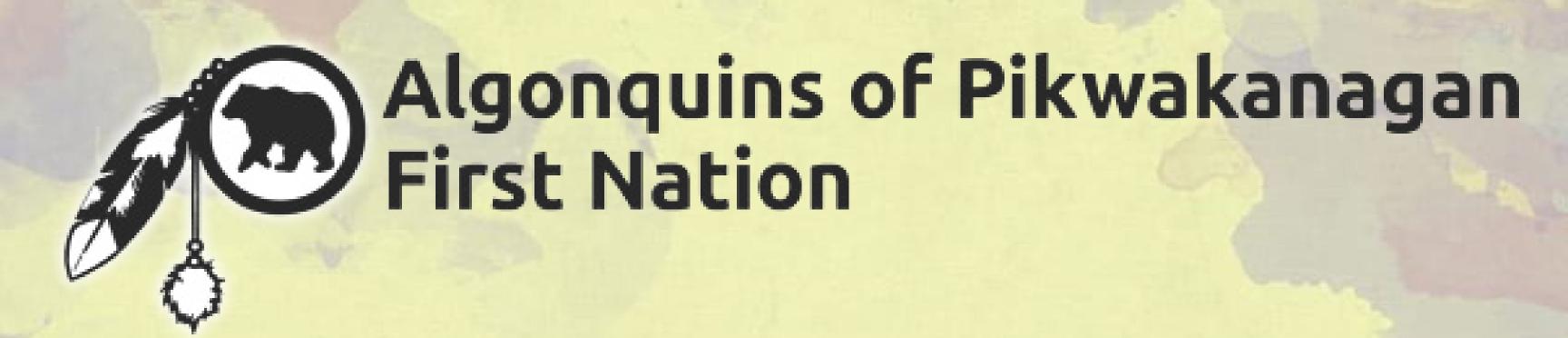
Unauthorized use will result in **trespassing** charges. The OPP is prepared to press **more severe charges** if damage occurs.

The Kilby Farm and Beach Property needs to be maintained and protected for uses that benefit the community as a whole; it is not for individuals to use for their own entertainment.

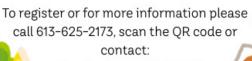

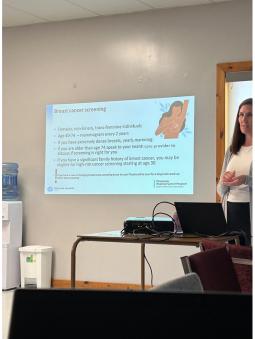

Valvular Heart Disease Screening Day

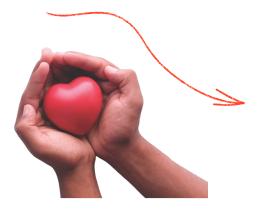

Valvular heart diseases are dysfunctions of the "doors" that direct blood flow within the heart. These diseases affect hundreds of thousands of people in Canada. Heart valve problems are often undetected, and late detection may have severe consequences.

The University of Ottawa's Heart Institute mobile screening program offers early detection, diagnosis and treatment.

We are seeking community members and staff 50+ who have not yet had this screening done and who currently do not have any know heart disease



Your 30-to-60-minute appointment involves:

- a mini ultrasound of your heart
- questioning, measurements, and rapid finger poke blood tests to evaluate your cardiovascular risk factors
- A cardiologist will review the results and recommendations will be provided at the end of your visit.

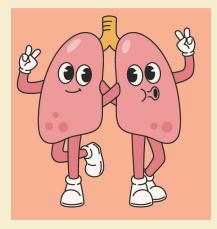

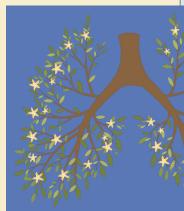

Cancer screening is about helping you live a good life

Cancer screening is testing done on people who have no symptoms and generally feel fine, but are at risk of getting cancer. Regular screening is important because it can find some cancers or pre-cancers early when treatment has a better chance of working.

Four organized cancer screening programs are offered to eligible people in Ontario.



Women* 40 to 74 years old who are eligible

If you think you may be high risk for breast cancer and are 30 to 69 years old, talk to your health care provider.

Every 2 years for most

*Breast cancer screening is recommended for women, Two-Spirit people, trans people and nonbinary people ages 40 to 74 who are eligible for screening through the Ontario Breast Screening Program (OBSP).



COLON

Fecal Immunochemical Test (FIT)

People 50 to 74 years old who are eligible

If you have a parent, sibling or child who was diagnosed with colon cancer, please contact your health care provider to see if you should be screened with a different test.

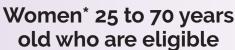

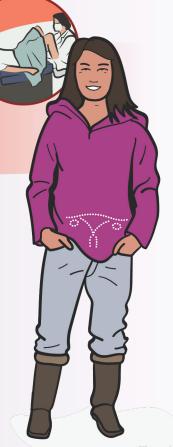

Every 5 years for most

*Cervical screening is recommended for eligible women, Two-Spirit people, transmasculine people and nonbinary people with a cervix.



LUNG Low-Dose

Tomography (LDCT)

People 55 to 80 years old who are eligible

If you are age 55 to 80 and have smoked cigarettes every day for at least 20 years — it does not have to be 20 years in a row, which means there could be times when you did not smoke — talk to your health care provider about being referred to an Ontario Lung Screening Program (OLSP) location, or contact an OLSP location directly.

Every year for most



The screening tests are free for eligible people in Ontario. Make sure your Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP) card is up to date. You might get a letter from Ontario Health (Cancer Care Ontario) asking you to get screened for cancer. These letters are part of Ontario's cancer screening programs.

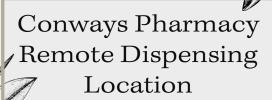
